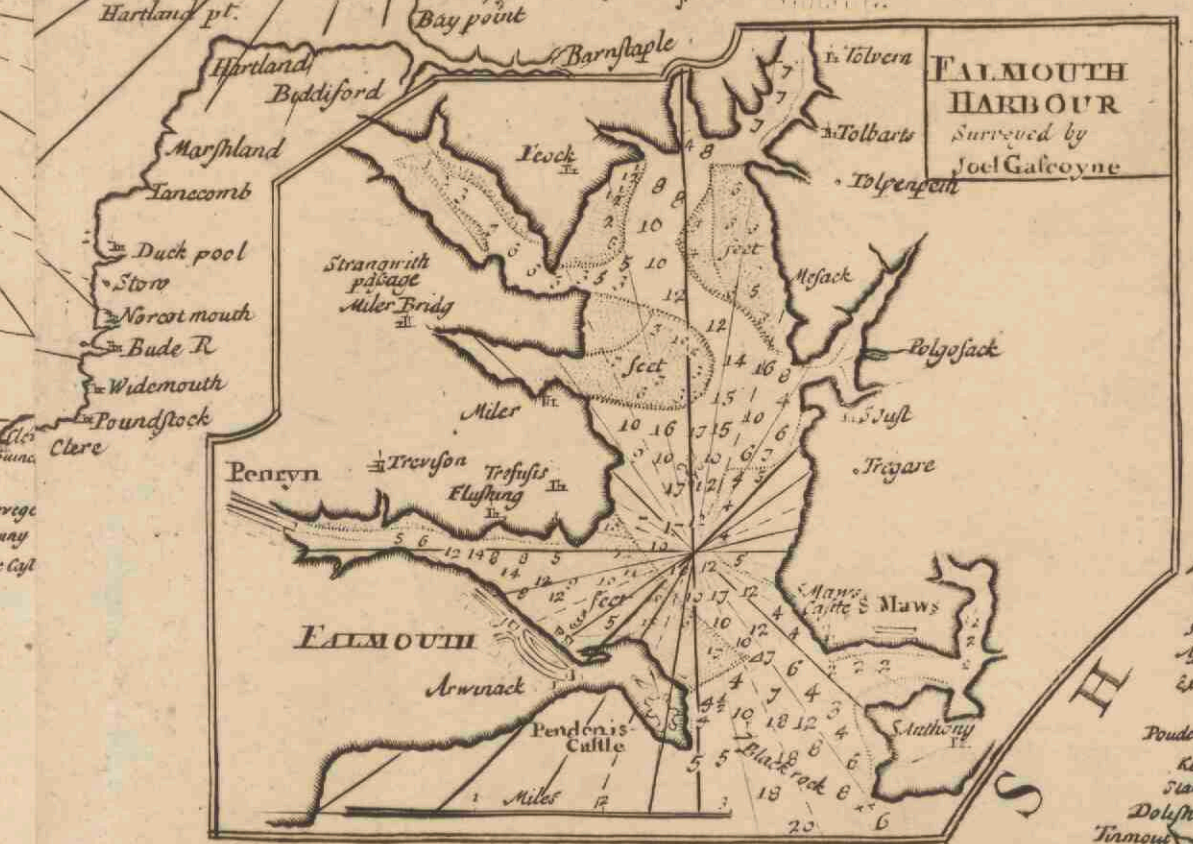


Add therefore the time of Moons Southward or Northward to the Number found near the place where you Ship is, and the Summe shall show you how long if Tide will run to the Eastwards, but if it be more then 12 Subtract 12 therefrom. The Direction of the Darts shew upon what point of the Compass the strength of the Tide sets. 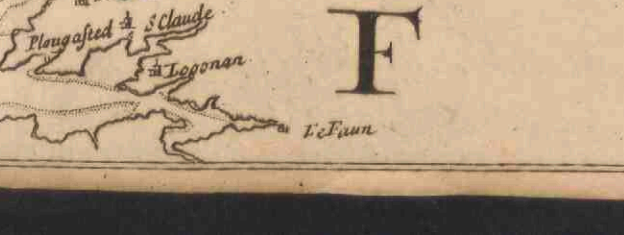
