





HE Character of Inigo Jones is so univerfally known, that his Name alone will be a fufficient Recommendation of the following Designs; the Originals of which (drawn by himself and Mr. Webb) belong to the Earl of Burlington.

No better Account can be given of his Life than what Mr. Webb hath already done in the Preface of his excellent Defence of that judicious Treatise, entitled, Stonbenge restor'd, there being scarce any Materials left, from whence to compile it.

Palladio's Design of the famous Church of Santo Georgio at Venice, (so deservedly admired by all good Architects) is added to this Work, to shew that as great a Rival as that Restorer of Architecture was to the Antients, his Disciple was in no respect inferior to him.


If the Reputation of this Great Man doth not rise in proportion to his Merits in his own Country, 'tis certain, in Italy, (which was his School) and other Parts of Europe, he was in great esteem; in which places, as well as in England, his own Works are his Monument and best Panegyrick; which, to-

gether

gether with those of *Palladio*, remain equal Proofs of the Superiority of those two Great Masters to all others.

To this Collection are added Designs of Doors, Windows, Gates, Peers, Chimneys, Insides of Rooms, and Ceilings; as also some few Designs of Buildings by the Earl of Burlington. The other Particulars will be shewn in the following Tables annex'd to each Volume.





A TABLE of the Plates contained in the First Volume.

PLATE I, 2.



HE General Plan of the Palace, design'd for White-hall, consisting of seven Courts, A, B, C, D, E, F, G.

A, The Grand Court, round which is a Terras of 30 Feetwide, and equal to the Height of the great Plinth of the Building.

B, A circular Persian Court, with an Arcade; round which

are Offices under the King's Apartments.

C, A Square Court, with an Arcade; about which are the Offices under the Apartments of the Royal-Family.

D, E, Two Courts belonging to the Apartments and Offices of the Royal-Family.

F, G, Two Courts which belong to the King's Apartments and Offices.

H, The great Hall, with Portico's and Galleries, which includes two Stories.

I, I, Two circular Vestibules, with Doric Pillars.

K, An open Vestibule, with Portico's and Arches, the middle Part of which includes two Stories.

L, A Square Hall with Pillars of the Doric Order, leading to the King's Apartments.

M, M, Two Square Vestibules with Pillars, between the circular Court and the Courts F, G.

N, N, Kitchens, &c. belonging to the King.

O, O, Kitchens, &c. for the Use of the Royal-Family.

P, P, Vaults under the Chapel and Banquetting House.

Q, Q, &c. Arcades and Passages for the Communication of the several Apartments and Offices.

The rest of the Rooms, &c. of this Plan, are for the Several proper Offices belonging to the Palace.

R, R, Are the grand Entrances into the Palace.

The Section of the Chapel, by the same Scale as the foregoing Specimens.

The Section of the Banqueting-House, by the same Scale.

PLATE 52.

The Plan of the Ceiling of the Banqueting-House, by the same Scale; the Compartments of which were painted by Rubens.

PLATE 53.

Designs for Windows; the three uppermost are Doric, Ionic, and Corinthian, the three others are of the same Orders, without Pilasters or Columns; the Height of the circular Opening of the Window, is twice the Breadth to the Center of the Arch; the Height of the rest are twice the Breadth.

PLATE 54

Venetian Windows. The first with three-quarter Columns, where the Side opening is equal to the Diameter of the Pillar: The second with three-quarter Columns, and a Recess, where the Side Opening is one third of the middle Opening; and the third with Pilasters, where the Side Opening is equal to half the middle Opening, which is twice the Breadth of the Opening to the Center of the Arch.

PLATE 55.

Designs for Doors, the Height of the Openings is twice the Breadth, and the Recess equal to the Architrave, which is one sixth part of the Opening.

PLATE 56.

Designs for Doors with three-quarter Columns: The Height of the Openings are twice the Breadth, and the Recess equal to the Architrave, or one sixth part of the Opening.

PLATE 57.

Designs for Rustick Doors, one with an Architrave, one with *Doric* Pilasters, and the other with *Ionic*, three quarter Columns: The Height of the Openings of which are twice the Breadth, and the Recess as before.

PLATE 58.

A Design for Temple-Bar, in the Manner of a Triumphal-Arch, the Height of the middle Opening is twice the Breadth, as are the Arches on each side.

PLATE 59.

Rustic-Gates, the two sirst were Design'd by the Earl of Burlington, the other, which is Doric, by Inigo Jones; the Height of the Opening is twice the Breadth; and the Recess one sixth part of the Breadth.

PLATE 60.

Peers, with Columns, Pilasters and Niches; the Distance or Opening between them is equal to twice the Breadth of the Peer.

PLATE 61.

Rustic Peers with Niches; the Opening or Distance of which is twice the Breadth of the Peer.

PLATE 62.

Designs of Chimney-pieces; the Heights of the Openings are equal to the Breadths.

PLATE 63.

Other Designs of Chimney-pieces with their Ornaments; the first is at the Earl of Burlington's, the middle-most is at the Honourable Mr. Arundel's, and the third is at the Honourable Mr. Pelham's, Secretary at War; their Openings are as before.

PLATE 64.

A Chimney-piece at the Right Honourable Sir Robert Walpole's at Houghton; the Pannel over it is in Basso-Relievo, the Opening as above.

PLATE 65.

A Chimney-piece in the Drawing-Room at Kensington, the Frame over it was adjusted for a particular Picture.

PLATE 66.

Ceilings, the uppermost at the Honourable Mr. Pelham's; the other by Inigo Jones, in the King's-House at Greenwich.

PLATE 67.

Sides of two Rooms, the uppermost is at the Honourable Mr. Arundel's, the other at the Earl of Burlington's.

PLATE 68.

The Side of a Cube Room: The Cove of the Ceiling, is one third of the Height of the Room, the Opening of the Door is twice the Breadth and one fixth high.

PLATE 69.

Designs for a publick Gallery, with Paintings and Statues; the Ceiling in three Compartments for Painting.

PLATE 70.

A Building of the Earl of Burlington's at Chiswick, of which this is the lower Plan, and one of the Fronts, with the Profile of the Portico.

PLATE 71.

The principal Front and Plan of the Apartments of the foregoing House, in the middle, of which is an Octagonal Hall, which receives its Light by Windows near the Top.

The other Front of the foregoing House, and the Plan and Elevation of a Temple in the Garden at Chiswick.



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
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
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
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





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
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
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































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
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
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



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
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
